Our special presenter at the Nov. 22 festival is Toni Buzzeo, author of numerous children's books. Toni is also a graduate of the College of Arts, Sciences, and Letters, so we are

especially pleased she will be speaking to the children about the process of writing. Her book *One Cool Friend* (Dial, 2012) was named a 2013 Caldecott Honor

Book, a huge honor and achievement!

The festival also features breakout sessions focused on writing. Children will practice their writing techniques while adults learn tips for supporting children's writing development. At the end of the morning, there will be a book signing with Toni. A selection of her books will be available for sale or attendees can bring their own copies of her books for signing.

The festival's check in begins at 8:30 a.m. with speakers at 9:00 a.m. The event is free and open to the public. Online registration begins Oct. 13, 2014 and is encouraged to help us plan seating, sessions, give-aways, and refreshments.

The Mardigian Library Envisions the Future



As the next step in planning for the Mardigian Library's future, the campus engaged the architectural firm Ouinn Evans and the independent consultancy firm BrightSpot to help define what it means to be a physical library in a digital age. In March they met with focus groups to hear ideas on how the library can • develop creative, achievable plans for spaces, services, and people in support of the following vision: The Mardigian Library will be an essential part of the UM-Dearborn experience; a gathering place for learners, a campus hub for academic success and interdisciplinary collaboration, and a catalyst for integrated learning and community engagement. In the library, students will:

- Thrive in an environment of flexible spaces, comfortable furnishings, the latest technologies and information resources, and helpful services;
- Expand their learning beyond the classroom to further develop 21st century skills—creativity, collaboration, communications, and critical thinking;

- Build connections and gain confidence as they interact with faculty, staff, community partners, and peer counselors to achieve higher levels of academic success:
- Examine new ideas, question old assumptions, and create new solutions.

Using this input, Ouinn Evans and BrightSpot developed a conceptual design for transforming the library. They built upon the strengths of the existing building to meet the needs of UM-Dearborn students for decades to come.

Highlights of the design include:

- More welcoming entrance to provide a more accessible connection to campus and the community;
- Improved flow through the main floor and up to higher floors;
- Wide variety of learning environments classrooms, group study, collaboration zones, learning commons, quiet study, and graduate study center:
- Gallery, exhibition, and presentation space;
- Flexible furnishings;
- Completely upgraded technical and HVAC infrastructure, reducing our energy.

Graduate Research Center:

The Graduate Research Center was established 2nd floor were transformed to provide focused support for masters and doctoral stu-

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Fewer Stacks on the 2nd Floor:



Upon completion of a major review of the bound scholarly journal collection, we no longer needed many of the shelves on the 2nd floor of the library. In July the unneeded shelves were removed and collections were

New carpeting was installed and the existing furniture was rearranged in August. Students love the additional space, better access to electrical outlets, and views out to campus. The 2nd floor will be our testing area for new ideas for furnishings and services.

New Services for the Future



The campus-wide conversations over the past two years about the future Distributing computing throughout of the library identified ways that physical spaces and furnishings should change. We also identified some new ways librarians and staff can support student success and the academic mis-

sion of the university. Although a renovated building will greatly enhance the impact of these new services, we are not willing to wait for a full renovation before we get started.

Expanding on the services and conceptual space design strategies for the library, three synergistic projects are in the planning for 2014-15.



Expanded Group Study Options:

variety of different group study options are planned for the 2nd floor including pod type rooms created using modular walls, partially enclosed study nooks, and some flexible, open furnishing options.

We hope to increase the group study options from 2 to 20.

Mini-Learning Commons:

the building is a key element of the conceptual design. The creation of a technology rich learning commons is also part of that plan. We plan to test these two concepts by strategi-



cally placing computers from the 1st floor computing lab throughout the building. A cluster of those computers will be placed on the 2nd floor in a model "learning commons."

Model Classroom:

The vacated computer lab on the 1st floor will be transformed into an experimental active learning classroom



where librarians and instructional faculty can test the latest in instructional technologies and pedagogical trends.

When not in use as a classroom, students will be able to reserve space to experiment

with the same technologies for group study. It is an exciting time at the Mardigian Library
